You're about to meet Denis, whose mother watches seizures steal his sleep four hours at a time. Miranda, who held seed packets like they might disappear after watching her disabled son suffer and wondering what her children would eat. Children like Gabriela, who stole food to survive before finding safety. And Maria, who discovered joy at 81 after eight decades of accumulated pain.

These families face barriers that seem impossible to overcome—disabilities without support systems, poverty without escape routes, abuse without safe havens, and aging without dignity. But in each story, you'll witness something extraordinary: what

happens when Christ's love reaches across continents through generous supporters like you and Mission Without Borders working together.

As part of a global community of supporters spanning many countries, your generosity becomes the bridge between despair and possibility. Where hope fades and need is overwhelming, God works through your support and our teams to create spaces where traumatized children can finally speak their truth, gives tools that restore dignity alongside addressing hunger, and reminds elderly women forgotten by the world that they are precious in His sight.

These aren't just stories about surviving—they're stories about what happens when the body of Christ refuses to let distance have the final word.

Welcome to their world. Welcome to hope breaking through.

In Leova, Moldova, over 30% of people are elderly, and many of them are battling poverty and loneliness, trying to survive on a meagre pension, just like Dumitru. WHEN TOMORROW LOOKS DIFFERENT THAN YESTERDAY

At fourteen, Denis has never spoken his mother's name or taken his first steps. He lives with his parents and sister in Romania, where love fills every corner, but hope feels far away.

Denis was born with conditions affecting his brain, muscles, and spine. He has autism and seizures that strike without warning. At three months old, Anisoara watched her baby slip away.

"He started eating less, he lost a lot of weight, and he couldn't move his head properly. It seemed as though he suddenly became unresponsive," she remembers.

"It feels like every time we visit the doctor, we come back with a new diagnosis. We haven't been given any hope that he could recover from any of it."

In Romania, families like Denis's tumble into bureaucracy and broken promises. With only one support teacher for every 47 children with disabilities, parents watch their children's potential slip away.

Seizures hold the family hostage. Denis sleeps only four hours nightly. Both parents can barely work. When Florin takes jobs abroad, Anisoara moves in with her mother because facing seizures alone paralyses her.

"I panic a lot when Denis has epileptic fits, and I can't be alone with him," she says.

Being Roma adds heartbreak. "When I go with my child to the doctor, they treat me differently because of my heritage," Anisoara says.

The breaking point came in a hospital room. "I reached a point where I fell into depression, and I considered leaving him in a children's institution. However, I came to my senses eventually and realised that I didn't want to give him up."

Two years ago, Denis joined Mission Without Borders' child sponsorship program. This wasn't just aid—it was an invitation into family.

Costi doesn't just visit—he enters their world. He knows Denis's favourite songs, celebrates good days, and sits with Anisoara when she's overwhelmed. For a family used to fighting alone, having someone who genuinely cares changes everything.

"Resources for families with disabilities are significantly lacking in Romania. Emotional support services are rarely offered, leaving families struggling alone," Costi explains.

The groceries, clothes, and nappies mean one less worry. But it's the emotional support that transforms this family. "The regular support helps Denis's family to find resilience and optimism. They no longer feel alone in their struggles," Costi observes.

For the first time in fourteen years, Anisoara doesn't feel like she's drowning.

Now, when Denis has seizures, she panics, but she's not alone. When he responds to music or moves to avoid hurting their puppy, someone celebrates. When she doubts herself, Costi reminds her: "Anisoara is a good mother."

Hope has returned. Denis lights up when music plays, beams when his mother returns. His parents now have emotional space to notice these moments instead of just surviving.

"While we search for solutions that fit his needs and our budget, we're committed to offering him a safe environment and showering him with as much love as possible," Anisoara says.

She can say that with hope instead of despair—because she knows someone else believes in Denis too. Someone else sees him as a beloved child worth fighting for.

ON THE OUTSKIRTS OF HOPE

WHAT SARAH PATERSON LEARNED ABOUT HOPE IN A SINGLE ROOM WITH SEVEN CHILDREN



On the edge of the small Romanian village the gravel road turned to mud and our car slid slightly as the rain pelted down. We were on our way to meet a new family, joining the Mission Without Borders program.

Nicholai and his 7 children live in a single roomed house on the outskirts of the village. He is a single dad, his wife having left the family some years ago, struggling to care for his children.

When we went inside Nicholai was serving up a meal for his 3 youngest boys, about to arrive home after attending a weekly kids club at the local church. The food had been cooked over a wood heater in the corner of the room and when I looked in the bowls I saw a simple potato stew.

The three boys tumbled into the house, drenched after walking up the hill from the village in the rain. They were carrying large bottles of water. With no running water in the house, water is collected from a well in the village. The kitchen consisted of the wood

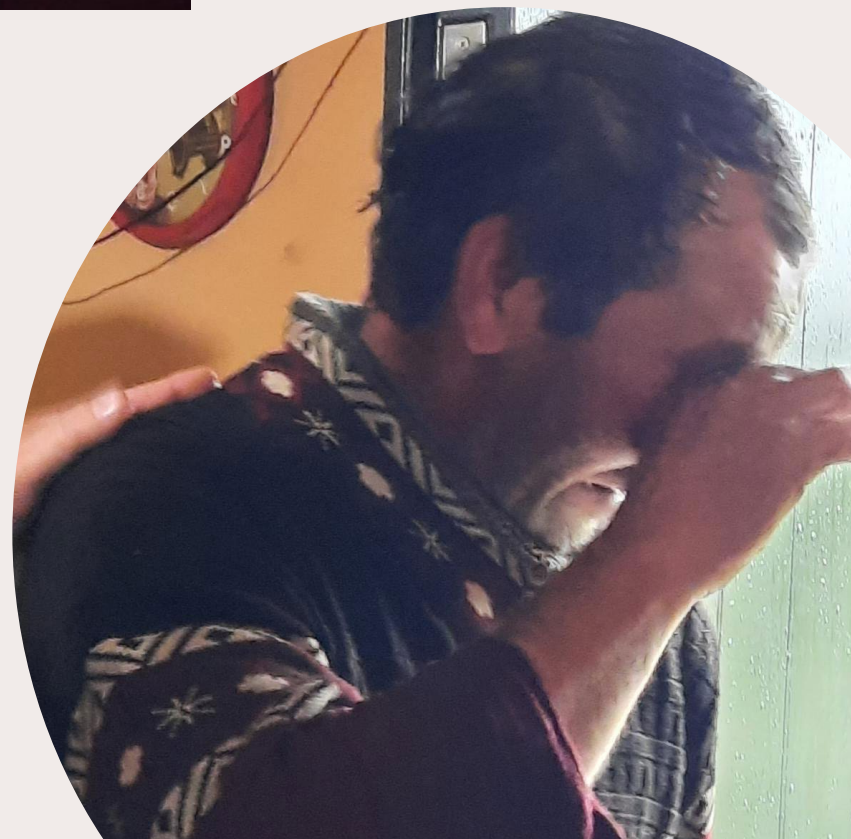
heater, and I quickly realised that the bathroom was out near the vegetable garden – some cloth held up with sticks for a bit of privacy but saturated in the rain.

We asked Nicholai about the work opportunities in his village. Unemployment is very high in rural parts of Romania, especially for those with little education and are without transport. Nicholai sometimes gets paid for doing odd jobs for his neighbours or working as a day labourer. He carries water, collects firewood and does everything he can to put food on the table for his family, but it is easy to see how little they have to eat.

Nicholai showed us his hands, shaking. I go to bed every night, shaking from exhaustion from trying to work enough to care for my family” he told us.

Alex, the local MWB coordinator for this village, told Nicholai that he would return with some food and clothing for the kids. They are not alone. There are people who care and will help them.

Nicholai’s eyes filled with tears as he thanked us for helping his children, not only through the gift of food but also for the kids programs at the local church, where they find warmth, friendship and learn about Jesus. When the school year starts, these boys will have the school supplies they need, shoes that fit, and we pray that they will have a new hope for life, growing in their hearts.



SPONSORING A FAMILY

For just \$45 a month, sponsors can take one of four sponsorship spots for families like Nicholai's, providing regular food parcels, clothing, household essentials, and the support they desperately need. The children get school supplies and shoes that fit, they can attend programs where they find friendship and learn about God's love, and perhaps most importantly, the whole family discovers they're not alone anymore.

In Cantemir, Moldova, twelve-year-old Gabriela was aggressive, violent, and stealing food to survive when she first walked into Mission Without Borders' community centre.

"Unfortunately for many children here, their homes feel like a living hell where fighting, abuse, and unsanitary conditions are common. You always know these children by their behaviour issues when they come to the day centre," explains Boris Garconita, who works for MWB supporting sponsored children.

Gabriela lives with her mother, stepfather, three siblings and two cousins in an old house without a bathroom or toilet. "Her stepfather drinks very often, and sometimes he'll drink nonstop for days; the mother also drinks a lot. The mother and children are often physically abused, and they're always anxious and afraid when the stepfather is drunk. For Gabriela, home is a place of distress."

"I asked her why she was stealing and she said, 'I don't want to steal, but when I haven't eaten for a day or two, I'm so hungry and so I do it.'"

Something shifted when Gabriela found consistent safety, food, and care at the centre. The transformation wasn't instant—it was built through daily acts of love.

"Since Gabriela started attending the youth club regularly, she has become calmer and more peaceful. She has changed her speech and behavior. Gabriela doesn't steal anymore and has no problems with the police."

WHERE VOICES FINALLY MATTER

During a Bible lesson about healing, eleven-year-old Ilona suddenly burst into tears. After years of silence, she revealed she had been sexually abused. The volunteer immediately notified MWB staff, who worked with authorities and her family. Through speaking out and receiving support, the traumatic hold over Ilona's life was broken.

"Ilona received full healing from this burden that she carried alone for many years. After opening up about what happened to her, Ilona became so much more joyful, energetic and sociable," Boris recalls.

This is what happens when children discover their voices matter. "Many children at our children's club have opened up about the hurts and trauma they've experienced. Here, children hear about God and receive peace and healing. Their hearts open up to receive the care, love and acceptance they find in God and reflected in the MWB staff and volunteers, and this changes them."

The community centre offers more than hot meals and homework help—it provides something these children have never experienced: unconditional safety and belief in their worth.

"At MWB's community centre, children are given good food placed on a clean, beautifully arranged table; here they do their homework; here they can take a shower or wash their clothes. It's also a place where children learn to master skills for the future."

"Being close to children like Gabriela and Ilona, you see how, over the months, they change. If they were aggressive, they become calm; if they were reserved, they become friendly and smiling; you see how they heal emotionally, spiritually," Boris observes.

In Cantemir, 70% of the 490 children enrolled have at least one parent with alcohol issues. Thirty percent have two alcoholic parents. Yet these children are discovering something revolutionary: they belong somewhere safe.

"Most of all, we can help them to find a better home in Jesus. In Him they will always belong and be safe, and his love and compassion will never fail or disappoint them."

Europe's Poorest Nation: As Europe's poorest country, Moldova faces hunger, migration, separation, and harsh winters. We provide child sponsorship, family support, warm clothing, and mentorship program.

ROMANIA

**FROM SHADOWS
TO LIGHT**

**MARIA'S JOURNEY
THROUGH COMMUNISM
TO JOY AT 81**

"My faith is the only thing I never want to lose. Singing, worshipping, and praying together with my brothers and sisters is pure joy." - Maria

Maria sits in her small Romanian home without running water or a bathroom, her weathered hands holding pages from the Book of Psalms. At 81, she has found something she never expected to discover: pure joy.

"My life has been a chain of sadness. I don't have any happy memories," she says, her voice carrying decades of accumulated pain.

Born into poverty under Communist Romania, Maria watched her childhood disappear into food queues and survival. "I was just a little girl when my mother neglected me in the hopes that I would die. She eventually chose to give me up for adoption to one of her cousins."

At fourteen, she married. At fifteen, she held her first baby. Nine children followed—one daughter died shortly after birth, but under Communism, they wouldn't tell her why. "I was very young, actually 15, when I had her and didn't dare to ask for more information."

Under Ceaușescu's regime: Life was incredibly hard. Official rations of bread, eggs, meat, and oil were not only insufficient but mostly missing from stores. People stood in queues for days. Heating, hot water, and electricity were cut off daily. Maria worked wherever she could find it, often paid with food instead of money.

Decades of unregistered work meant no official pension. Today, Maria receives just 70 Euros monthly in disability allowance after falling from a horse-drawn wagon, which injured her back. She lives with her husband—"My marriage life reads like a novel, a very intense one"—and an adult son with a chronic illness.

Twenty years ago, everything changed with a desperate prayer. "We didn't have a church in our village during Communism. But one of my grandsons was very sick with a slim chance of ever recovering. I asked God to heal him, and to everyone's surprise, He did. It was then that I

decided this is the God I want to follow."

The transformation wasn't immediate—it was built through twenty years of discovering she wasn't alone anymore. Her faith became "the only thing I never want to lose."

Today, Daniel from Mission Without Borders visits regularly, bringing food parcels, hygiene items, and something Maria had rarely experienced: consistent human kindness. "The cooking oil I receive through the food parcels means so much to me. Every bit of support I receive from the Mission is so important to me, and of great help."

She reflects on the cruel irony: **"Providing for my children during Communism was such a huge everyday challenge, and now, I find myself grappling with the difficulty of sustaining myself on a meagre income."**

But something has shifted in Maria's narrative. The woman who began with "a chain of sadness" now speaks of worship as "pure joy." In her small home without modern conveniences, she has found what eluded her for eight decades... belonging.

Maria represents thousands of elderly Romanians whose pensions remain devastatingly low due to unregistered work under Communism. Most have endured profound hardship, loss, and trauma. Yet Maria's story whispers something revolutionary—that it's never too late for light to break through.

In a life defined by endurance, Maria discovered that survival was just the beginning. Joy, it turns out, can arrive at any age, in any circumstance, when someone believes you're worth visiting, worth caring for, worth seeing as more than your struggles.

The pages of Psalms in her hands aren't just words anymore—they're promises fulfilled, proof that even after decades in shadows, light still finds its way home.

HELP SUPPORT UNDERPRIVILEGED FAMILIES ONE SEED AT A TIME

Miranda, single mother of three, Albania

For families across Eastern Europe, the question "How am I going to feed my children today?" haunts daily life. Food insecurity affects countless households struggling with scarce jobs, low wages, and rising prices. The war in Ukraine has worsened the crisis, disrupting agriculture and driving costs higher.

Miranda, 45, cares for three children alone in Albania. Her eldest son, Nesti, 21, has autism and needs constant attention—she can't work. When his disability benefits stopped, she faced impossible choices.

"I don't have the power to face everything in my life. It's not easy being alone and raising three children in such conditions."

SEEDS OF CHANGE

Instead of temporary food aid, Miranda received something transformative: seeds and gardening tools. Not charity, but opportunity.

"There is hope and the promise of food inside each of these seeds, and they are already blooming! I never had the right tools for planting before now, but thanks to MWB's support, my family can look forward to eating fresh, nutritious food such as carrots, cucumbers, tomatoes, beans, and fresh salad."

DIGNITY THROUGH WORK

In Bosnia-Herzegovina, Salih needed work, not handouts. As a single father of three, he knew forestry, but employers expect workers to own expensive chainsaws.

"To be fully employed in the forestry industry, you need to invest in your own tools because employers don't provide expensive tools—they expect you to have your own. I couldn't afford them."

When someone provided him with the equipment he needed, Salih regained more than just employment—he restored his role as a provider.

"You have equipped my children, you enabled me to have a job that allows me to keep providing a decent life for us. And what more could a father want?"

RIPPLE EFFECTS

These programs create lasting change. Families learn agricultural skills, food preservation, and cultivation techniques. Children witness resilience. Communities benefit as neighbours seek similar opportunities, and local economies strengthen when families spend less on basic food.

Miranda's son Amarildo, 16, watched his mother transform: "This is going to lower my mum's stress levels. It's so good to see her smile."

A reliable food source catalyses families' journey from surviving to thriving. By empowering individuals with resources and skills, these programmes help them walk in freedom, positively impacting communities as they step into their potential.

Miranda no longer asks, "How will I feed my children tomorrow?" Now she asks, "What should we plant next?"

ADI'S STORY

FINDING FAMILY WHERE LOVE LIVES

"I'm blessed to know that God is my greatest support. I have God and my friends, and that's more than enough." — Adi, 46, MWB volunteer for nearly 20 years

Adi was abandoned the moment he entered the world. Born with disabilities, he spent his childhood watching his siblings grow up with parents who couldn't bear to look at him.

"My parents left me as soon as I was born after seeing my disabilities," says Adrian, who survived Communist Romania's brutal orphanages while his four siblings lived at home.

His sister became a famous athlete, celebrated on TV. She lives nearby but has never visited. "It's our parents' problem to deal with," she once said about her disabled brother.

For years, Adi brought flowers to his mother on Mother's Day. She would take them through the window, then send him away without a word.

LIFE IN COMMUNIST ORPHANAGES

Under Ceaușescu's regime, tens of thousands of unwanted children were abandoned to state care. Lack of funding led to terrible conditions—children neglected, malnourished, and mistreated. Disabled children faced institutionalisation as a matter of course.

"One of my good friends couldn't bear to see me getting my hopes crushed over and over again. He told me I shouldn't visit her anymore and that I didn't deserve this humiliation. So I stopped."

THAT'S WHEN ADI DISCOVERED SOMETHING HIS BIRTH FAMILY NEVER GAVE HIM: UNCONDITIONAL BELONGING.

In the orphanage, he found his first real family among other forgotten children. When Mission Without Borders began visiting in 1990, bringing food, love, and hope, Adi found his second family.

"I first heard about God while in the orphanage,

when Mission Without Borders started visiting us. Those moments were filled with joy, laughter, and a sense of belonging that we hadn't felt before."

MWB supported Adi through school and protected him from exploitation. Someone offered to take him to France to beg on the streets—because of his disabilities, they saw easy money. Thanks to MWB's support, "I knew I had far better prospects than a life of begging."

ADI'S LIFE TODAY

Today, Adi works at a successful bakery and spends every evening volunteering at MWB's warehouse. For nearly 20 years, he's been there—never missing Operation Christmas Love packing week, taking vacation time to help spread joy to struggling families.

"Almost every day, after work, he can be found at the warehouse helping with whatever needs to be done," says Cornel, MWB's warehouse chief. "I am constantly amazed by his strength, especially as he has to do everything with only one hand. What stands out most is that he never complains."

The man who was rejected for his disabilities has become irreplaceable. "We could leave the warehouse in his care, and we'd have no worries," says logistics manager Viorel.

Adi hasn't seen his biological family in years, though they live nearby. "I hold no resentment towards my parents and family anymore. Instead, I pray that one day they, too, will come to know God's love."

What they threw away, others treasured. What they saw as a burden, others see as a blessing. "My heart is content with my faith," Adi says. "I don't want to be rich. I've always appreciated the simple moments."

The child nobody wanted became the man everyone depends on. Sometimes, the family that finds you is better than the one that made you.
